

Everyone at Camp Achieve is safe and supported.

We make the safety of all campers, counselors, and staff our top priority.

Camp Achieve provides 24-hour medical supervision to give campers, and parents, freedom from worry. The 2013 Camp Achieve Medical Staff consisted of 18 doctors and nurses from area medical centers including The Children's Hospital of Philadelphia and St. Christopher's Hospital for Children. Each day an average of 6 medical staff were available to respond to any camper or counselor need. Without the dedication of our Medical Staff, Camp Achieve would not be possible.

Likewise, before the start of Camp, the EFEPA and Medical Staff conducted a Seizure Recognition and First Aid Training for area first responders at the nearest medical center in a effort to put in place safety measures in the outlying community.

In 2013, 6 new medical staff joined the Camp Achieve community in addition to 11 returning from 2012.

The future of Camp Achieve is bright. Expanding the community of campers and counselors is our shared vision.


We're always striving to improve the overall experience of Camp Achieve.
